#### **TOMATO FRITTATAS**

SERVES 6

Preparation time: 15 minutes Cooking time: 20 minutes

4 egg.

8 small (cherry) tomatoes, sliced half a red pepper, finely diced half a small red onion, finely diced I bunch of basil to taste, chopped

half a tsp salt

half a tsp black pepper

Preheat oven to 180C/fan 160C/gas mark 4. - Whisk the eggs together, then add the vegetables and basil leaves - Season with salt and pepper - Pour the mixture into greased cupcake moulds - Place in the oven for 20-25 minutes until golden and risen.

Serve with a salad or take them on a picnic.

Don't forget for August **only**, the store opening times will change to Tuesday, Thursday, Saturday 10 -12.30 and Sunday 10 - 12 noon.


